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FRANCESTOWN CELEBRATES 250 YEARS!

Governor John Wentworth dedicates Francestown in honor of wife, Frances Deering.

June 25th was a wondrous day of celebration for Francestown as it honored its 250th anniversary. Months of planning culminated in a week of organized chaos executed by an army of volunteers. The week leading up to the big event included the

erection of several tents for the sold-out BBQ community dinner and the Beer Garden. We thank the Con-Val School District for their generous donation of the tents and instruction. A team spent 3 days pounding stakes and making sure the tents were taut; tables and chairs were set with precision. With preparations set, the events of June 25th were set to go forth like a well-oiled machine.

On the big day, final touches were made. A canon was moved into place, stages were set, hogs put on the roaster and the team from Atlas Fireworks wired the nearly eight hundred explosive-filled shells that would light up the night sky to cap off the day's events.

As the sun blazed overhead, hundreds of people gathered

Article 01 Election of Officers

To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year. (By Official Ballot)

Article 02 Operating Budget

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate TWO MILLION FIFTY THOUSAND TWO HUNDRED TWENTY-SIX DOLLARS (\$2,050,226) for general municipal operations. This article does not include appropriations contained in special and individual articles addressed separately. The Select Board recommends this article 3-0 and the Budget & Advisory Committee recommends this article 3-0 (2 absent).

Article 03 Capital Reserve Funding

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate FOUR HUNDRED SIXTY-TWO THOUSAND THREE HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$462,300) to be added to the Capital Reserve Funds in the following manner:

\$10,000 Future Replacement of Fire Equipment \$175,000 Future Replacement and Purchase of Highway Equipment \$2,300 Future Cemetery Improvements \$20,000 Future Replacement of Police Vehicles \$50,000 Future Replacement of Fire Trucks \$20,000 Future Town Facilities Improvements \$10,000 Future Revaluation of Real Estate \$175,000 Future Town Road Improvements

And authorize the withdrawal of ONE HUNDRED FORTY-TWO THOUSAND THREE HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$142,300) from the unassigned fund balance and the balance of THREE HUNDRED TWENTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$320,000) to be raised by general taxation. The Select Board recommends this article 3-0 and the Budget & Advisory Committee recommends this article 3-0 (2 absent).

Article 04 Cemetery Maintenance Trust Funding

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate TWO THOUSAND THREE HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$2,300) to be added to the Expendable Trust Funds in the following manner:

\$2,300 General Cemetery Maintenance Trust Fund

Said funds to be withdrawn from the unassigned fund balance. The Select Board recommends this article 3-0 and the Budget & Advisory Committee recommends this article 3-0 (2 absent).

Article 05 Purchase and outfit 10-wheel dump truck.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate THREE HUNDRED FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$305,000) to purchase and outfit a new 10-wheel dump truck, said funds to come from the Future Purchase and Replacement of Highway Equipment Capital Reserve Fund, and to further authorize the disposal of the existing 2009 dump truck and equipment as best serves the Town. The Select Board recommends this article 3-0 and the Budget & Advisory Committee recommends this article 3-0 (2 absent).



Article 06 Re-adoption of the Veterans' Tax Credit

To see if the Town will vote to re-adopt the provisions of RSA:72:28, II, in accordance with RSA 72:27-a, previously adopted [2005, Warrant Article 24], for an Optional Veterans' Tax Credit at FIVE HUNDERED DOLLARS (\$500) per year. If re-adopted and approved this article shall take effect for the 2023 property tax year. The Select Board recommends this article 3-0 and the Budget & Advisory Committee recommends this article 3-0 (2 absent).

Article 07 Repair and/or Replacement of Town Bridges

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate ONE HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$100,000) for the repair and/or replacement of Town Bridges, said funds to come from the Future Repair and Replacement of Town Bridges Capital Reserve Fund. The Select Board recommends this article 3-0 and the Budget & Advisory Committee recommends this article 3-0 (2 absent).

Article 08 Replacement of Police Cruiser Computers

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate TWELVE THOUSAND NINE HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$12,900) for the replacement of two cruiser mounted computers for the Police Department, said funds to come from the unassigned fund balance. The Select Board recommends this article 3-0 and the Budget & Advisory Committee recommends this article 3-0 (2 absent).

Article 09 Authorize Select Board to convey tax deeded proper

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Select Board to convey any real estate acquired by a tax collector's deed. Such conveyance shall be by deed following a public auction or the property may be sold by advertised sealed bids in accordance with RSA 80:80. Further, pursuant to RSA 80:80, III, the Select Board shall be authorized to convey any such property in a manner other than provided, as justice may require, if in the public interest. This authority shall remain in effect indefinitely, until rescinded. The Select Board recommends this article 3-0.

Article 10 Reconstruction of Red House Road

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate THREE HUNDRED FORTY-FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$345,000) to perform necessary engineering, preconstruction and reconstruction activities on Red House Road, said funds to come from the Future Town Road Improvements Capital Reserve Fund. The Select Board recommends this article 3-0 and the Budget & Advisory Committee recommends this article 3-0 (2 absent).

Article 11 Modify Elderly Exemption Income/Asset Amounts

To see if the Town will vote to modify the provisions of RSA 72:39-a, as previously adopted [1997, Warrant Article 18], for an Elderly Exemption from property tax in the Town of Francestown, based on net income, for qualified taxpayers, of not more than \$25,000 {currently \$13,400} or, if married, a combined net income of less than \$40,000 {currently \$20,400}; and own net assets not in excess of \$75,000 {currently \$50,000} excluding the value of the person's residence. The exemption, based on assessed value, as currently adopted and not proposed to be changed, is: for a person 65 years of age up to 75 years, \$40,000; for a person 75 years of age up to 80 years, \$60,000; for a person 80 years of age or older \$80,000. To qualify, the person must have been a New Hampshire resident for at least 3 consecutive years, own the real estate individually or jointly, or if the real estate is owned by such person's spouse, they must have been married to each other for at least 5 consecutive years. The Select Board recommends this article 3-0 and the Budget & Advisory Committee recommends this article 3-0 (2 absent).



Article 12 Town Facility Projects

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate FIFTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$50,000) to complete Town Facility projects generally outlined, but not limited to:

\$28,000 Town Hall Painting Maintenance \$22,000 Old Meeting House Clock and Bell Maintenance

Said funds to be withdrawn from the Future Town Facilities Capital Reserve Fund. The Select Board recommends this article 3-0 and the Budget & Advisory Committee recommends this article 3-0 (2 absent).

Article 13 Adjournment

To transact any other business that may legally come before the Town.

SELECT BOARD REPORT

Marsha Dixon, George Ravalico, & Scot D Heath

2022 was a good year for Francestown. Planning for the Francestown 250th celebration, the Quarter Millennium, started shortly after the March 2022 Town Meeting with a very active 250th Celebration Committee headed up by Jamie Pike, Town Administrator, who coordinated the entire event from research and planning to the firework display to end the evening. Beverly Abbott worked endlessly as she took the lead in organizing the dinner for 325 people, the parade down Main Street, children's activities, and a myriad of other things that helped make the day a success. Hundreds of townspeople stepped up and helped during the preparations and we appreciate the efforts our fantastic Francestown residents gave to the Quarter Millennial Celebration. The details of the event are described elsewhere in the Annual Report, but overall, it was a grand celebration and a milestone for our town.

Life goes on in Francestown despite the lingering effects of the Covid-19 Pandemic. Although there are still active cases of Covid present in our community and around the world, many residents are venturing forth much more than last year. The Old Meeting House hosted 10 outside concerts over the summer which together with the 250th brought some much-needed activity back to town.

Meanwhile, the Select Board was busy carrying on the business of town government. The State of New Hampshire awarded Francestown \$165,723.71 from the federally funded American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) to be allocated for town projects by 2024 and spent by 2026. This program was made available to communities in the United States to help post pandemic economic situations. Approved expenditures included air purifiers for the library, new portable radios for the fire department, face masks and PPE for the elections, financing toward the Household Hazardous Waste Day 2022, replacement of the Horse Shed doors, upgraded police vests and window shades for the Town Hall to buffer sound and improve energy conservation. As of the writing of this article, \$142,426.07 is left for future projects, some of which are in the initial stages of planning.

The Select Board honored Jamie Pike when he received his diploma as a Certified Public Manager from State of NH Bureau of Training on May 29. The 2-year program consisted of 300 hours of coursework focused on personnel and project management. His Capstone Project was a 49-page thesis detailing the 250th Francestown Celebration which can be seen in the Bee Hive Museum, quite an accomplishment given he completed this entire course of study while working full time.

The Select Board awarded Fuss & O'Neil the Engineering contract for the Old County Road North bridge. The Town will be responsible for 20% of the engineering and design costs, while the full cost of construction will come from the Federal Bipartisan Infrastructure Act passed earlier this year. Construction is estimated to begin in the summer of 2025. Warrant Article #15 from 2022 to purchase a 10-wheel dump truck for the Highway Department was carried over to 2023 due to supply and demand issues surrounding the Pandemic. Gary Paige, Road Agent, is monitoring the anticipated assembly of the truck for Francestown and hopeful for an early 2023 delivery date. Costs are increasing so this is foremost in all our minds. The Highway

Department paved a large section of Bible Hill from Poor Farm Road to the top of the hill, as well as did a considerable amount of work on the drainage shoulders of many town roads. \$124,000 was awarded to Francestown for bridges and highways (not currently under construction) from the state surplus fund. The Reid Road culvert at the intersection of Route 136 technically qualifies as bridge construction, due to its size, and was chosen as the project for this funding by the Select Board at the recommendation of the Road Agent.

Per the Warrant Article #17 from 2022, Francestown Fire Department purchased 17 portable radios and 6 mobile units as the old transmitter system was no longer viable. Money was appropriated from the New Hampshire Locality Equipment Purchase Program, ARPA and the Mount Crotchet Firefighters' Association. The units have been delivered and are currently in use. Chief Kullgren and his crew showed the Select Board their new winter track system for their retrofitted off-road vehicle which is designed for winter rescue. Given the increase in hiking and walking in the town forests and FLT land, we appreciated that the Fire Department is prepared for the unknown.

The Select Board and the community welcomed Juliane Wigsten as a full time Police Officer on May 27 after she received her NH Police Standards & Training Council Academy Graduation diploma. The presence of Chief Fred Douglas, two part time officers and a full-time officer is welcome as they work diligently to keep our residents safe. The Police Department, with the approval of the Select Board, purchased new tazer units to keep up with the technological changes as well as police vests out of the ARPA funds.

The Recreation Commission Director, Meagen

Kerris, brought new life to the recreational activities in town. Finally, after the pandemic of the last two years, Scoby Beach could re-open to the public complete with lifeguards. The Select Board approved the location for a Recreation Center on the first floor of the Town Hall. Such utilization will be coordinated with the town scheduled events and elections. The Recreation Center will accommodate indoor activities for the young and older folks. Children's activities, a Coffeehouse, game nights, dances, family gettogethers, and the like are some of the many activities to be offered by the Recreation Commission. The first Coffeehouse was held on January 7th and was an outstanding success. Children ages 5-10 enjoyed a new soccer league which will continue into the winter at the Francestown Elementary School gym. A pickle ball court was erected on one of the tennis courts and was enjoyed this fall by all ages and of course, baseball and swim lessons were happily welcomed back as the kids were able to exercise with friends again.

The Select Board has been working with the NH Department of Transportation on minimizing speeding along Main Street. Research ensued with discussions about speed bumps and lowering the speed limit. The DOT has direct input into what Francestown is allowed to do given that Route 47 is a state highway and they were against both potential solutions. Permanent digital signs were put up at the northern and southern entrances of town and two other movable digital signs can now be used on Rt 47 and Rt 136, farther out from the center of town, to help those areas with the speeding issues as well. Discussion is ongoing about 30mph speed signs on route 136.

FIHS approached the Select Board regarding a Christmas tree being planted next to the current Christmas tree with the idea that when the older tree dies there will be a younger, replacement tree ready to take its place. The second tree is now planted on the Town Hall green for all to enjoy in years to come.

The 2022 primary and general election under the direction of Moderator, Paul Lawrence, Asst. Moderator, Kevin Pobst, and Pamela Finnell, Town Clerk were awarded high praise when inspected by NH Attorney General staff conducting a routine check on election proceedings. The respect residents show one another is a credit to everyone living in Francestown and it is consistently shown during the entire voting process year after year. Diversity of opinion makes up the fabric of Francestown.

In closing, it is a pleasure for all of us to be on the Select Board and work with residents on the various issues that come up throughout the year. We strive to keep an open ear to hear your concerns and address them appropriately. Feel free to reach out to us so that we may help continue to make Francestown such a special place to live.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the government activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Town of Francestown as of and for the year ended December 31, 2021, and the related notes to the financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Town of Francestown, as of December 31, 2021, and the respective changes in financial position thereof, and the budgetary comparison for the General Fund, for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are required to be independent of the Town of Francestown and to meet our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audit. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Town's ability to continue as a going concern within one year after the date that the financial statements are available to be issued.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement. whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with generally accepted audit standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Misstatements are considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgement made by a reasonable user based on the financial statements.

In performing an audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, we:

 the Town's ability to continue as a going concern for a reasonable period of time.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit, significant audit findings, and certain internal control related matters that we identified during the audit.

Other Matters

Required Supplementary Information

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the pension schedules on pages 29 and 30 be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is requires by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board, who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational and economic context. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

The Town of Francestown has not presented a management's discussion and analysis. Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America have determined that the management's discussion and analysis is necessary to supplement, but is not required to be part of, the basic financial statements.

Supplementary Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the Town of Francestown's basic financial statements. The combining nonmajor and individual general fund schedules are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the basic financial statements. Such information is the responsibility of management and were derived from and related directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to

prepare the basic financial statements or to the basic financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the combining nonmajor and individual general fund schedules are fairly stated, in all material aspects, in relation to the basic financial statements as a whole.





BUILDING INSPECTOR

JOHN KENDALL

The primary mission of the Building Department is to provide quality service to the community that is knowledgeable, efficient, comprehensive and helpful to the public. The intention is to safeguard life, health, property and public welfare by regulating and controlling the construction, quality of materials and use of all buildings and structures within the Town of Francestown. The department is responsible for the administration and enforcement of the uniform codes and related Federal, State, and City adopted laws and ordinances. We are using the 2018 International Building Codes as adopted by the NH Legislature in 2022. I try to take a customer-service based approach to these responsibilities. Interpreting building codes and regulations can be cumbersome and I am available to assist anyone with questions. As the Code Enforcement Officer, I am required to address and/or investigate any and all issues or complaints being brought forward. At the conclusion of an investigation, it is my job to determine if in fact a zoning violation has occurred and to initiate the corrective actions for compliance. Please don't hesitate to call (603-562-6363) or visit the Town Office during my hours on Tuesdays from 5:30 to 7:30 PM.

In 2022, we issued 46 mechanical permits, 39 electrical permits, 9 plumbing permits, 12 demo/zoning permits, 5 septic permits and 12 solar permits. We issued 26 building permits which included 2 cell towers, 4 sheds, 5 barns, 1 chimney, 4 garages, 2 carports, 1 deck, 1 pool, 2 remodels, and 4 new homes.

EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT DIRECTOR

In 2022, we continued our focus on town mapping and ensuring that Francestown is prepared for all natural disasters.

A major focus of our department is to ensure that all 911 assigned addresses are correct and that each residence and business in town is clearly marked so our responders are able locate them in an emergency. Major goal of this office is to have 100% of the addresses in town clearly marked with a visible sign posted where the driveway meets the road. Address markers should feature at least six-inch reflective lettering. The Francestown Volunteer Fire Department has a quantity of these signs available to purchase at our cost. If you are interested in obtaining a reflective address sign, please feel free to reach out to me or to contact the Francestown Fire Department.

In this upcoming year, we will continue to work with our state and federal partners to ensure that the Town of Francestown is equipped to handle emergencies at the local level. We will be exploring grant opportunities to ensure that local government is able to function even during times of severe storms. We will also be looking to make our emergency operations center, which is located in the Francestown Fire Department, more efficient and better equipped to communicate and manage emergency response on a town wide level.

HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

Gary Paige, Road Agent

In review, we hauled 3000 yards of sand for winter use from Bennington to Francestown and hauled 4000 yards of gravel to various roads in town. Last summer, we did reconstruction on Bible Hill Road on two targeted sections totaling 2400'. Reconstruction included reclaiming of old pavement and recycling it in place, installation and repair of drainage, adding stone and gravel, and repaving of road.

Future reconstruction in 2023 is proposed work of about 1.25 miles of road on Red House Road. Similar process as stated above on Bible Hill. This project is high on the priority list, but with inflation and price changes occurring so often and drastically, we will move forward as funding

permits.

In March of 2022, voters approved the purchase of a tandem axle truck with plow and wing set up. Due to supply chain issues, we have yet to receive this vehicle. The department will be asking for a similar vehicle in March of 2023 to replace our present 10 wheeler as planned in our Capital Improvement Program.

Supplies and products used by the highway department are harder to get and increasing in cost steadily. This not only makes our jobs more difficult, it limits us as we have to do the same amount of work with less resources for more money. We will continue to do our best.

GEORGE H. BIXBY MEMORIAL LIBRARY

Our library operating system, Biblionix, has a nifty little feature that calculates the amount saved by patrons checking items out from the library instead of buying them. It's based on the retail price of books, DVDs, and other things you can borrow from the library. Sometime in late December 2022, the year-to-date value of that calculation was \$124,937.

In addition, at year's end in 2022, the equivalent value of the movies, TV shows, audiobooks, ebooks and music patrons borrowed through Hoopla and Kanopy, the streaming services offered through the library, was about \$27,000. It would be difficult, however, for the library to assemble the collection of titles, topics, and programs that patrons chose for themselves. Many are not available in a physical format to put on the library shelves; nor do we have the space to store them even if they were. In fact, not only do we not have \$27,000 to spend on AV and digital materials, but there's also no way we could accurately choose the range of information and entertainment titles Francestown patrons were able to access through their library cards.

The same applies to the offerings of New Hampshire Downloadable Books, aka the Libby app on your smart device. In 2022, Francestown patrons read or listened to 1966 titles from NHDB. Yes, there are waiting periods, but the retail cost of that number of titles is about \$117,960. George H. Bixby Memorial Library patrons have access to them for just over \$600 per year in subscription fees to the New Hampshire State Library.

That's just things to read, watch or listen to. The library also offered low or no-cost programs on genealogy and memoir-writing, craft workshops and narrowboat travel in the UK; book discussions with local leaders and facilitators from the New Hampshire Humanities Council, and our first Halloween Costume exchange so

that our trick-or-treaters can be someone or something new when they outgrow their favorite costumes. We joined with the Conservation Commission and the Francestown Land Trust to host the Joan Hanchett Nature Series lectures in the spring and the fall at Town Hall, and various groups used space in the library to hold their meetings.

In 2022, we issued 99 new library cards to over 99 patrons, because we offer Family cards and Adult, Juvenile, Seasonal and Non-Resident cards. We have over 586 cardholder accounts, up from 524 at the beginning of 2022. Why don't those numbers add up? Because we also removed cardholder accounts for patrons no longer living in Francestown.

Here's a snapshot of what George H. Bixby Memorial Library patrons borrowed from the library in 2022:

Most popular adult fiction: Lessons in Chemistry by Bonnie Garmus; Maid by Nita Prose; Hotel Nantucket by Elin Hilderbrand; and Wish You Were Here by Jodi Picoult.

Most popular adult nonfiction: *These Precious Days* by Ann Patchett; *From Strength to Strength* by Arthur C.

Brooks; *Things to Look Forward To* by

Sophie Blackall; and *Braiding Sweetgrass*by MacArthur Fellow Robin Wall

Kimmerer.

Most popular magazine titles: *Bottom Line Personal, The English Garden,* and *The New Yorker.*

Most popular Experience Boxes: *Try the Ukulele* (all ages); *Contraptions* (youth).

Most popular games: *Hisss* (ages 4+); *Dragonwood* (ages 8+); *Sleeping Queens* (ages 8+); *Outfoxed* (ages 5+); and *Kitty Corners* (ages 5+)

In the Children's Library, we introduced new programs, continued and expanded patron favorites, and welcomed a return to more inperson programming. The year began with the introduction of our new experience box program, an opportunity for patrons of all ages to try new things. Each box contains materials,

activity ideas, books, and other resources for exploring a new activity or hobby. Cartooning, weaving, ukulele, and contraptions are just a few of the Unboxes our patrons can borrow. Another new program this year arose from a partnership with the Francestown Heritage Museum. We collaborated with Bill McAuley to create a Family Seek & Find Adventure. The kickoff event was held in May, then the Heritage Museum continued to offer the activity each week during the Farmer's Market throughout the summer.

2022 was also a big year for old favorites. Our Take & Make Craft Kits continue to be popular. Each month we offer a new kit which contains a craft, art project, or challenge for our young patrons to take home and complete. Kits are available while supplies last and each month we send home 25 to 30 kits. The program was started during the pandemic, but it has been so popular we continue to offer it to patrons monthly. Expanding the tabletop games collection in the Children's Library also proved popular.

The Children's Library continued its collaboration with the Francestown Conservation Commission offering two Read & Ramble programs on the Quarry Loop trail. Thanks to David Luther for

making the posts for the trail and to Robin and Ben Haubrich for installing them. 2022 also saw the return of our Stories & Songs program for our youngest patrons and their caregivers with seasonal story time sessions during the spring, summer, and fall.

Our Summer Reading Program began with the largest in person event since 2019. Mr. Vinny entertained a crowd of 50 with his Big Bubble Show. July was filled with in-person activities at the library or elsewhere in town: weekly art days, a STEM Boat Making Challenge, a writing workshop with author Erin Moulton, and a Monadnock Music family concert.

Program offerings and attendance were not the only areas of increase this year. Monthly

materials

circulation numbers in Children's saw significant growth this year too, nearly doubling what they were in 2021.

The programming year concluded with the return of another favorite from 2021. Book & Cocoa Bundles were inspired by Icelandic tradition of gifting books on December 24th then enjoying new books while sipping hot cocoa and eating chocolate. Our library version involves a quick registration questionnaire noting interests and favorite authors. We put together a bundle of library books, including at least one brandnew title, along with some hot cocoa and chocolate, and bundle them up for patrons to pick up the week of the 24th. This year we doubled the number of participants in the

Program. It's a lot of fun for us to pick books we think you will enjoy.

In 2022, we began to envision the evolution of library services in Francestown. We look forward to continued growth and learning in 2023.



LIBRARY TRUSTEES

Daryl Hazel, Chair

After operating for two years with uncertainty and worry, a "new normal" was established at the library in 2022, and both programs and patrons have returned. The library staff has done an outstanding job of re-establishing old programs and practices, while creating new opportunities for members of the Francestown community to use and enjoy their library. Having a staff, such as we do, makes the work of the trustees much easier.

The development and maintenance of library policies and procedures is one of the main functions of the Board of Trustees; these enhance the library staff's ability to manage the library and provide for the safety and well-being of library patrons and staff. Some of the policies and procedures that we discussed, reviewed, updated, or created this year:

- COVID return-to-work policy
- Mask policy
- Closing due to inclement weather
- Reconsideration of materials (handling requests to remove items from collections)
- COVID-related paid time off
- 3-day weekends for staff when federal holidays are celebrated on Mondays
- Historical-record collection
- Performance review procedures
- Bereavement policy
- Materials selection and collection development

Another of the trustees' responsibilities is seeing that the inside and outside maintenance needs of the library are attended to and paid for. These needs also include technical infrastructure and equipment, some of the items addressed by the trustees this year were:

- Replacing the ramp into the back yard
- Having shades purchased and installed in south and west facing windows
- Removing the gazebo that was crushed during a snowstorm
- Purchasing air purifiers and filters (using COVID-relief funds)
- Installing new shelving in the children's area
- Repainting needed areas
- Repairing a crumbling brick wall in the children's area
- Studying WIFI service, support, and security
- Replacing the printer
- Pruning trees in the front yard
- Evaluating tech-support options
- Removing the trees and brush on the back side of the property
- Installing an eye-wash station
- Installing an attic stair rail
- Painting the front fence
- Securing loose bricks in the walk

According to the New Hampshire Library Trustees Association, the board of trustees "prepares the annual budget in consultation with the director; presents and defends the budget to the municipal budget authority; has sole authority to determine budget lines for expenditures and move monies from one budget line to another; and reviews the budget on a regular basis and approves expenditures for unforeseen circumstances." Budget preparation was quite different this year, in that high inflation dictated that the Select Board and the Budget & Advisory Committee ask all town departments to accept the figures that they were given; we did so.

These figures were essentially last year's budget numbers adjusted for cost-of-living increases and inflation (where applicable). Though this situation causes us to postpone our dealing with various staffing concerns in 2023, we hope that the inflation rate continues to subside so that they may be adequately addressed in 2024.

One of our major efforts in 2023 will be to update the library's strategic plan. A preliminary process for doing so has been developed and a 5-member committee selected, but as of the date of this writing, we still need a facilitator who is not on the board or staff. As part of the strategic planning process, the trustees anticipate canvassing the community regarding the future direction of the library; however, input from the public would be welcome at any time. If you have any suggestions, please send them to me, Daryl Hazel, at darylftown@gmail.com.

Also, our monthly meetings are open to the public and all are welcome. Please check our website and local public listings for dates and times.

POLICE DEPARMENT

The following report is submitted on behalf the Francestown Police Department regarding the general activities of our organization and departmental changes from January 1 through December 31, 2022. We remain committed to our primary mission of providing a responsive and professional law enforcement service to the community of Francestown. We will continue to work in concert with the citizens of Francestown to provide a safe and positive quality of life for all.

Personnel: During 2022, we congratulated Officer Juliane Wigsten on completing the 188th Full-Time Law Enforcement Academy in Concord which commenced on February 7th and she graduated from on May 27th. Both Officers Booker and McAllister still maintain their part-time officers' status with this agency.

<u>Training:</u> Francestown's officers attended various training sessions to remain current and proficient within the profession. These trainings included Firearm and Taser recertification, Use of Force, De-escalation, Ethics and Implicit Bias.

<u>Calls-For-Service:</u> 1,166 Hillsborough County Dispatch Logs

Note: There were 268 Calls for Service related to non-criminal activity in various categories that are not related to the non-criminal activity in miscellaneous categories not stated on the following page.

It should be noted that the surrounding agencies of Greenfield, Lyndeborough, New Boston, Deering, Hancock and Bennington and Francestown have mutual aid agreement with each other. These towns work in concert with one another to assist each other with emergency coverage throughout the year when needed. There were twenty-six (26) complaints reported to the New Hampshire State Police in 2022.

Closing Remarks: It is extremely important for us to recognize that law enforcement officers answer to the citizens of this community, especially in these trying times over the last few years. History and tradition dictate this reality. Law enforcement officers carry out sworn duties and cannot hope to accomplish our goals without the support of the citizens of Francestown, our effectiveness depends on it. A well-informed citizenship is essential to our democracy.

I would like to extend my appreciation to our employees for their dedication and commitment to Francestown's citizens and the law enforcement profession. I would especially like to thank the citizens and businesses of our community for their continued support as we work in partnership with one another to improve the quality of life and public safety for everyone.

PUBLIC ASSISTANCE ADMINISTRATOR

During 2022, the town did not receive any requests for assistance from new clients. One potential client applied for assistance, but moved from Francestown before any assistance was provided. Budget expenditures for 2022 were used to support current clients with the four basic needs - food, heat, electricity, and housing. The ongoing Covid-19 pandemic did not have a direct impact on the budget. As discussed in last year's report, the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds are available to recoup expenses directly related to Covid-19 if necessary. I have partnered with other private and government agencies to provide unique forms of assistance not normally covered under the town's assistance guidelines. One example of such assistance is necessary repairs to automobiles that allow potential clients to continue travel to work.



SOLID WASTE COMMITTEE

Becky Moul, Chair

The Transfer Station ran well in 2022. There were no recycling changes placed upon us by state ordinances or broker changes. Costs have increased for hauling and disposal fees like all other aspects of our lives. Since 1972, Francestown has had mandatory recycling as we changed from a landfill to a Transfer Station (TS) to accommodate the environmental concerns, especially since the TS is located right next to a stream. Today, we still have these concerns as well as rising cost issues. Recycling is important and we need to do our best at it. Because we reached outside of the box several years ago, we are able to recycle our plastic bags. A huge thank you goes out to our volunteers who drive these bags to Peterborough.

New at the TS in 2022, the asphalt was repaired this past summer with a new overlay. New ideas for 2023, we are hoping to have a Compost Workshop to assist in saving hundreds of pounds of food trash going into the compactor. If residents participated in backyard composting, it would allow for increased cost savings for the TS. The Select Board, Waste Disposal Committee (WDC), and TS attendants are working together for the betterment of all residents.

We would like to welcome Eddy and Carl Hardwick and thank them and Henry Hardwick for their hard work at keeping the TS clean and safe. We would also like to thank Johnny Hardwick and Sam Giza for their efforts while working at the TS in 2022. We also welcomed Kevin St. John to the TS committee and thank Mike Tartalis for his service with us over the

years. Presently, our committee consists of Becky Moul, Kelly Marshall and Kevin St. John. There are 2 openings available. If you have an interest in serving the town via this committee, please give the Select Board office a call at 603-547-3469.

The State of NH has a goal of a 40% recycling rate. In 2022, Francestown had a 42.8% recycling rate! This is a 2.8% increase in recycling (just shy of our 3% goal); nice work Francestown residents. In 2022, we transferred a total of 700.1 tons with 294.5 tons being recycled materials and 405.6 being compactor materials. Our recycling efforts keep us just ahead of the state goal. Let's all work together to increase our rate back up to 45% this year.

Revenues are generated two ways at the Transfer Station. The first way is resident fees for E-Waste, Construction and Debris/Bulky Waste (CD & Bulky), and Tires. Collection and selling of Aluminum Cans and Metal is the second way. Total revenues collected in 2022 was \$20,530 and it was deposited into the town's general fund.

Slash Trash at Home, in the Office, and in Your Community

- 1. **Buy package-free** food and body-care products to cut the amount of packaging that winds up in landfills or incinerators. You can find package-free items at grocery stores, personal and homecare shops, and buy-in-bulk retailers.
- 2. Instead of using single-use take-out utensils for lunch, **bring your own reusable set** to the office (and pack them with your kids' lunches, too!).
- 3. **Swap out plastic** body-care items like toothbrushes, cotton swabs, and shower loofahs for ones that are more sustainable and plastic-free. Your local grocery store and personal-care shops likely carry some of these alternatives. You can also check out options online.
- 4. When ordering coffee from your favorite shop, **bring a reusable mug or thermos** for the barista to refill instead of getting a single-use togo cup. You may even get a discount on your

morning pick-me-up!

- 5. **Redesign your space** with fewer surfaces for junk to go on minimal surfaces mean less clutter, and less clutter lowers waste.
- 6. Make school and office supplies last longer. Swap out staples for paper clips. Replace the ink when your pen runs out. Use a laptop or smart tablet for taking notes.
- 7. **Trade plastic wrap** for reusable beeswax wraps. Usually made from organic cotton, beeswax wraps are even compostable. You can find beeswax wraps at your local grocery or kitchen supply store.
- 8. Rather than using disposable k-cups for your morning coffee, **brew an entire pot for your family or your colleagues.** This helps cut back on plastic waste, *and* you can even compost the coffee grounds and filters.
- 9. Instead of using paper towels which aren't recyclable turn your old clothes, cloth towels, and linens into reusable rags.

With our town growing, it is important to try and keep everyone "in the know". In an effort to help educate our residents, we are sharing information concerning plastics. Remember, we do recycle plastic bags, but not with regular plastics. There is a designated location on the right as you walk into the recycle room. Please be sure your bags are clear of any debris or food leftovers.

In 2022, the Francestown Volunteer Fire Department responded to 154 emergency calls and the Wardens reviewed over 150 requests for burn permits. These permits can be obtained online through the Fire Department's webpage on the Town's website, www.francestownnh.org or by going to the state website, www.nhdfl.org.

In addition to responding to emergency calls, non-emergency calls for service, trainings, and meetings, the volunteers also supplied hospital equipment to those in need in our community.

In 2022, the Fire Department, with funds from the Mount Crotchet Fire Fighters' Association, purchased three new department tools. We purchased tracks for our Kubota ATV to help increase our capabilities for off road search and rescue in winter conditions and a new Stokes Rescue Backet and Rescue Wheel that mounts under this basket to assist rescue crews with carrying an injured subject out of the woods. These new tools are great assets to improve our response capabilities for Wilderness Rescues.

The Fire Department has 911 address signs available for purchase. Please purchase your customized sign for \$20.00 and help us find you. These signs ensure that your house and driveway are well marked.

As a Volunteer Department, we pride ourselves on our ability to respond to requests for help as well as interact with the public in non-emergency situations. We are fortunate to have a strong core group of volunteers that are readily able to serve our community with pride. In turn, our mission could not be completed without the continued support of our community, for which we are very thankful. As a volunteer organization, we are always looking for new members; the Department will pay for required fire and/or EMS trainings. If you have questions or are interested, please stop by the Fire Station

on a Wednesday evening from 7:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m., talk with any member of our department, or contact me directly at 603-620-3198, fire.chief@francestownnh.org.

I want to take this opportunity to thank the men and women of the Francestown Fire Department for their devoted dedication to protect our community, especially through these recent challenging years. I'm very proud to work with such a well-trained and professional group of individuals! Thank you!

FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

This year was another year where we observed wet weather in early spring followed by rapid drying and drought conditions which extended through the summer for much of the state. Drying conditions in early May led to large fire growth on numerous fires which required multiple days to extinguish and firefighter response from local, state, and federal agencies. Wildfire activity continued through the summer months where dry conditions led to more multiday fires. Fires burned deep into the ground, requiring firefighters to establish water supplies and to spend days digging out all the hot spots.

This fall we had multiple fires started by the careless disposal of woodstove ashes. Before dumping your woodstove ashes, you should place them in a covered metal container until they are out cold. Many homes in New Hampshire are located in the wildland urban interface, which is the area where homes and flammable wildland fuels intermix. Every year

New Hampshire sees fires which threaten or destroy structures, a constant reminder that burn more than just Homeowners should take measures to prevent a wildfire from spreading to their home. Precautions include keeping your roof and gutters clear of leaves and pine needles and maintaining adequate green space around your home free of flammable materials. Additional information and homeowner recommendations available are www.firewise.org. Please help Smokey Bear, your local fire department, and the state's Forest Rangers by being fire wise and fire safe!

The long-lasting drought effects in Rockingham County are showing some minor signs of improvement but a good portion of

Rockingham County remains in moderate drought and much of the state is still in the abnormally dry category. While the drought conditions have improved, we expect some areas of the state may still be experiencing abnormally dry or drought conditions this spring. For this reason, we ask everyone to remember Smokey's message about personal responsibility and follow his ABC's: Always Be Careful with fire. If you start a fire, put it out when you are done.

"Remember, Only You Can Prevent Wildfires!"

As we prepare for the 2023 fire season, please remember to contact your local Forest Fire Warden or Fire Department to determine if a fire permit is required before doing <u>ANY</u> outside burning. Under State law (RSA 227-L:17) a fire permit is required for all outside burning unless the ground is completely covered with snow. Fire permits are also available online in most towns and may be obtained by visiting

www.NHfirepermit.com. The burning of household waste is prohibited by the Air Resources Division of the Department of Environmental Services. You are encouraged to contact the



upon the Common at the call of the Town Crier as they awaited the arrival of Governor John Wentworth and his beautiful wife, Lady Frances Deering. Promptly at 2pm, a military escort paraded down Main Street. Led by the cadence of Patriot Fife and Drum (Susan Walko and David Vose), a color guard of the NH Sons of the American Revolution and Francestown Veterans preceded the Governor and Ms. Wentworth. A group of local children also joined the procession, marking a day that was to be enjoyed by all ages. Governor and Ms. Wentworth, portrayed by Stewart and Carol Brock, relished in their welcome by the community as they strolled through the Village



greeting their constituents.

Following the parade, Governor Wentworth gave a proclamation declaring Francestown, in

BUDGET & ADVISORY COMMITTEE

Charles M Pyle, III, Chair

INTRODUCTION

As directed by a vote of the 1978 Town Meeting, the duties of the Budget and Advisory Committee (BAC) are:

- to advise and assist the Selectmen as requested.
- to participate with the Selectmen in the preparation and final compilation of the annual Town Budget, and
- to publish and post not less than fifteen (15) days prior to Town Meeting in two or more conspicuous locations within Town its findings and recommendations regarding each item of the budget and all articles proposing capital expenditures as approved by the Board of Selectmen.

BUDGET PROCESS

During the past year, the BAC met with the Town Administrator, Select Board, Department Heads and interested parties to review the operating budget and proposed warrant articles. BAC meetings are open to the public and held in the meeting room at the Town Offices; notices are posted in the Post Office and Town Offices. Interested parties are encouraged to attend.

The BAC reviews each year's budget proposals under the following operating/guiding principles:

- Utilize a three-year historical review of trends in actual expenses and previous budgets,
- Maintain the existing level of services.

2022 BUDGET & WARRANT

The 2022 proposed budget was the first post-pandemic budget and focused on a return to normal Town operations. Factors considered were increases to fuel prices, Peterborough ambulance service, across-the-board cost of living salary adjustments and Scoby Pond Milfoil. These were offset by reductions in the Land Use, Fire, Highway, Transfer Station and Library budgets.

2023 BUDGET & WARRANT

The primary 2023 budget consideration is the effect of inflation of materials, fuels, wages and other fixed costs. The proposed budget is approximately a 6.2% increase over the 2022 adopted budget. For more information on all warrant articles, including BAC analysis and recommendations, please see the complete Budget & Advisory Committee Report, available prior to Town Meeting. This year's report will be posted at the Francestown Post Office, Library, Town Offices and on the Town's website by the end of February. Special thanks to Jamie Pike for his diligence and assistance with this year's budget and thanks to fellow Committee members: Tom Anderson, Stewart Brock and Judi Miller for their participation in and dedication to the prep-

aration of our 2023 budget recommendations.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION

Betsy Hardwick, Chair

The Conservation Commission is the municipal agency responsible for seeing to the proper utilization of the town's natural resources and the protection of its water resources. It is also responsible for the management of Francestown's Town Forests and other conservation lands acquired through the commission, and for the stewardship of conservation easement interests held by the town.

We welcomed two new members this year, Elizabeth Hunter Lavallee and Anna Jo Dingman, and were sad to see two long-term members leave, Pam Avery and Don Shuffleton.

This year was a busy one. We reviewed and commented on four subdivision proposals; three two-lot subdivisions Map 2, Lot 11, Map 3, Lot 34.1, and Map 6, Lot 7.3 and one nine-lot subdivision on Woodward Hill Road Map 3, Lots 11 & 41. We also reviewed a lot-line adjustment application for property on Bible Hill Road Map 9, Lots 22.1, 22.2 & 22.3, two Conditional Use Permit applications for short-term rentals, and three applications to the Zoning Board of Adjustment.

Representatives from Trout Unlimited and the Merrimack River Watershed Council presented information to the commission on the proposed removal of an old dam on Brennan Brook. The removal of the dam will restore natural stream flow and improve natural processes for aquatic organisms. It will be done in such a way as to minimize disturbance and maintain as much of the historic aspects of the dam structure as possible. Commission members were in support

of the project and a letter stating such was provided to the Merrimack River Watershed Council to help secure grant funds and permit approval.

In celebration of Earth Day, we gave tree seedlings from the State Forest Nursery to the Francestown Elementary School children and held a roadside clean-up event on April 23rd. A lot of trash bags were filled thanks to the more than 30 people that showed up to help pick up litter! The "special" blue trash bags were also made available at the town offices, post office, and library for residents that could not make it to the event.

In 2022, we updated our short-term action plan and our page on the town website. We also initiated discussions about updating the Conservation Plan section of the Master Plan. We reviewed a letter from NH DOT regarding a proposed culvert replacement project at Whiting Brook on New Boston Road/State Route 136 and sent a response to their questions about conservation concerns related to the project.

The Commission continues to work with and support the Francestown Land Trust. Currently, we are working with them on a series of monthly "ads" in the Francestown News "celebrating special places". These ads will begin in January of 2023 and our hope is that they will help promote awareness of and appreciation for the many conserved natural areas in our community.

The Commission sponsored a few events in 2022. First, we conducted an afterschool hike in the Crotched Mountain Town Forest attended by 21 children and 10 adults and a Full Moon Hike in early spring at the Heath property on Candlewood Hill Road where 20 hikers were generously welcomed afterwards into the Heath's home for refreshments. Second, we installed a story book for children along the Quarry Loop

Trail, adjacent to the Farrington Road trailhead parking area, for our "Read & Ramble" program. Lastly, we sponsored 2 programs from the Joan Hanchett Nature Series, one on coyotes and the other on reptiles and amphibians, and they were given in cooperation with the library, Francestown Land Trust, and Francestown News.

Annually, we monitor our fee-owned conservation properties and town-held conservation easements making sure they are free from issues or problems and meeting grant and/or easement terms. Every few years, properties protected through state or federal grant programs are inspected to ensure compliance with the respective program. This year, members met with representatives from the state's Conservation Land Stewardship Program to walk the properties protected through the LCHIP program, the Hill and Varnum easements as well as parts of the Crotched Mountain Town Forest. Monitoring reports for LCIP and LCHIP grant properties were submitted to the appropriate state agency.

Trail work, in the town forests and other town owned-conservation areas, is an ongoing responsibility. We are grateful for the volunteers who help maintain of our many miles of hiking trails; we couldn't do it without their help! Trails on Crotched Mountain, Lord Shattuck Pond, Driscoll Hill Town Forests, and Dinsmore Brook Conservation Area were clipped back, cleared, and trail markers/signs were replaced or refreshed as needed. We approved a new trail in the Fisher Hill Town Forest which will provide a connection to a trail on the adjacent property without needing to use the state road. New signs were purchased for the Fisher Hill Town Forest trails and trailhead parking off East Road.

Members continued looking into a multigenerational trail and we determined that the best location for such a trail is a section of Bullard Hill Road, a non-maintained town road, off from Farrington Road. The parking for that location still needs further consideration. An unauthorized trail through an important wildlife habitat area on the westerly section of the Crotched Mountain Town Forest was brushed-in and 'closed" signs were posted.

We established a Watershed Study Sub-Committee to look into issues that impact water quality in our ponds and streams. Members include Kelly Marshall and Elizabeth Lavallee from the Con Com, Brad Howell of the Scoby Pond Association, and Cathy Eby of the Pleasant Pond Association. The sub-committee met several times and is looking into watersheds and water quality protection programs available to the town. There are plans underway for a spring presentation through the New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services on rain gardens and other techniques that may be used to help prevent water pollution.

Our natural resources are critically important to our health and well-being. These resources include safe drinking water, clean air, healthy wildlife habitats, outdoor recreation sites, and positive growth of forest products and food. These natural resources benefit us and help support our local economy. We look forward to continuing our work to help conserve and protect these resources and thank you for your support.

The Patriotic Purposes Committee is happy to report that in 2022 our normal activities resumed after a 3-year Covid hiatus.

We were able to resume the Memorial Day observance with the Francestown Elementary School (FES) participating in a parade from FES to Cemetery #3. With the Francestown Color Guard and members of the American Legion Post #50 leading the way, the students, faculty, staff, and parents marched down the road. The short service included the students leading the Pledge of Allegiance, patriotic songs sung by the students, a prayer and wreath presentation, students presenting flowers at the base of the G.A.R. monument, and the ceremony finished with the playing of Taps. Upon exiting the cemetery, each participant was given a small American flag. Later, wreaths were also placed on the gate at Cemetery #2 and at the Memorial Rock by the Old Meeting House. A big THANK YOU to the Francestown Volunteer Fire Department for providing safety guards for the parade with the elementary school children.

On November 11, 2022 at 11 AM sharp, the Veterans' Day Parade began with a color guard and members of the American Legion Post #50 of Antrim. They were followed by dozens of veterans, several area scout troops with their leaders, and 4-H members. The short parade route started at the Town Hall walkway, continued around the watering trough and scale, and stopped in front of Memorial Park for a quick service. Many residents, both young and old, assembled on the lawn to watch, remember, and pay their respects. Len Holmes of Francestown played Taps at the end of the service and then all participants were welcome to walk over to the Town Hall for a delicious Veterans Day luncheon. Thanks to the FES PTO and faculty for a wonderful luncheon and the many students who so graciously served all in attendance. The "Quilt Angel" in cooperation with the Auxiliary to the Francestown Fire Department crafted an exquisite quilt to be won via a raffle for veterans only. This year's winner was Steve Roy of Bennington, the Commander of the American Legion Post #50 in Antrim. His winning was most fitting as Steve has participated in all the Francestown veteran services since their initiation many years ago!



PLANNING BOARD

Robert Lindgren, Chair

The Francestown Planning Board was very happy to be able to return to in-person meetings in 2022-23. Over the year, we ruled on six applications for subdivision or consolidation and two for change of use, incorporated new laws into our ordinance and regulations, and continued our work to plan for the future needs of our town. In short, it was a busy year.

Rules & Regulations

The Town Ordinance:

In March of 2022, the Planning Board presented eight proposed amendments to the Francestown Zoning Ordinance. Voters approved six of them. Three of the proposed changes were basically housekeeping changes, bringing the statute up to date or clarifying language.

Three made significant changes to the town's laws:

- Voters approved an amendment allowing accessory dwelling units (a.k.a in-law suites) in detached accessory buildings.
 Prior to this amendment, ADUs were only allowed if attached to the primary dwelling unit.
- Voters also established a new, more streamlined method of approving minimal impact land uses: a Conditional Use Permit, establishing the Planning Board as the regulating authority, and
- Voters approved a new law permitting shortterm rentals (like Airbnb) by Conditional Use Permit.

Two amendments supported by a majority of the Planning Board failed to gain a majority of voter support. The first, a proposed amendment increasing vehicle and equipment allowances for home-based businesses, failed by a vote of 192 Yes to 247 No. The second, a proposal to allow landscaping and contracting businesses to be permitted by special exception, failed by a vote of 211 Yes to 224 No. The Planning Board proposed both of these articles because Board members believe that our rural community depends on small business and our laws must support both residential and reasonable commercial uses.

An amendment submitted by petition, but not supported by the Planning Board, proposed the elimination of all limitations to the number of vehicles and equipment allowed at a homebased business. It failed: 125 Yes to 286 No.

Board members will continue to work with and listen to the community in order to craft amendments to the town's Zoning Ordinance that will promote harmony - protecting the quiet enjoyment of the town's residential properties while meeting the needs of our businesses.

Regulations:

As directed by law, and following the passage of the Conditional Use Permitting ordinance, the Planning Board adopted regulations governing the permitting process.

The Rules & Regs Committee, a subcommittee of the Planning Board, is working on updates to the Site Development and Subdivision Regulations. They hope to have proposals ready for board review and public hearing this spring.

CASE WORK:

During the 2022-23 Board year, the Planning Board approved three subdivisions:

- A 2-lot subdivision of 51 acres of land on Cross Road, Tax Map 3, Lot 34.1
- A 2-lot Subdivision of 9.5 acres of land on Old County Road South, Tax Map 2, Lot 11

• A two-lot subdivision of 9 acres of land on 2nd NH Turnpike South, Tax Map 6 Lot 7.3

The Board approved three applications for Consolidation

(voluntary merger of lots):

- A Consolidation of 3 lots of record on East Road, Tax Map 4, Lots 13, 13-1, and 14, will be merged
- A Consolidation of 2 lots of record located on East Road and identified as Tax Map 8, Lots 97 and 98.
- A Consolidation and Lot Line Adjustment of land on Bible Hill Road, Tax Map 9, Lots 22.1, 22.2 and 22.3

The Board approved one application for the cutting of trees on a scenic road: from Eversource Energy for cutting trees on Poor Farm and Bible Hill Roads.

And, utilizing the new Conditional Use permitting process, the Board approved two applications for Short Term Rental of property (under Article II, Section 3.17):

- A Conditional Use Permit for a short-term rental property at 154 Hillside Lane, Tax Map 18, Lot 6.
- A Conditional Use Permit for a shortterm rental property at 270 Scoby Road, Tax Map 16, Lot 4.

As of this writing, the Board is considering a proposal for a subdivision/lot line adjustment which would create nine lots on 107+/- acres of land on Woodward Hill Road: an 8-lot subdivision of 104 acres and a lot line adjustment on the 9th lot. If approved as presented, it will be the largest subdivision in Francestown since 1988.

PLANNING:

An important part of the work of the Planning Board is planning for the future needs of our town. There are two major ways the Board works to plan for the future.

The Master Plan is where we review the current situation in town, identify needs and wants, and set reasonable goals. Ideally, The Master Plan should be updated every five years. Realistically, the Board updates the plan as it has time to devote to the project and, in the last decade, updates have been done by chapter. The next chapter in our rolling update schedule is the Community Facilities Chapter, last updated in 2015.

The Capital Improvement Plan is how the town plans for its upcoming needs for equipment and infrastructure: e.g. trucks and buildings. It is a six -year savings and spending plan that helps manage the tax impact of the town's large expenditures. This year's approved plan is detailed on the upcoming pages.

ADMINISTRATION:

In part because of a large number of volunteers, this year the Planning Board expanded the number of alternate members to the board, from three members to five. The Board continues its membership in the Southern NH Planning Commission: Linda Kunhardt is our Commissioner; Gary Schnakenberg is Alternate Commissioner.



CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM

2023 through 2028

The purpose of the Town's Capital Improvement Program (CIP) is to provide a valuable planning tool to help the Town anticipate, prioritize, coordinate and manage its capital expenditures. Capital expenditures are purchases of vehicles and various equipment items with a cost of over \$5,000 and have a life span of more than 3 years. Examples include dump trucks, fire trucks, police cruisers, self-contained breathing apparatus, radio equipment, and substantial facility repairs and updates. The CIP also considers non-capital items such as cyclical property revaluations.

The CIP is a 6 year plan, but also looks far beyond that time frame as some items such as fire trucks and 10-wheel dump trucks which take many years of planning. A major component of the CIP is the saving of funds in the Town's Capital Reserve Funds (CRF), making sure funding is available for these large expenditures when the time comes.

There are 5 major capital items for consideration for the 2023 calendar year;

- A new 10-wheel dump truck to replace the 2010 Mack that was purchased in 2009. This truck is on a 12-year rotation schedule and was delayed a year due to the vehicle being in good repair. The budget for this replacement is \$305,000, and will be funded by a withdrawal from the appropriate CRF.
- There are two town facility maintenance projects, the first being painting of the north façade of the Town Hall. This side was last painted in 2013 and is need of a full scraping

and re-painting along with carpentry repair. The belfry is also included in this project. The Town has accepted a bid in the amount of \$21,500 and adding a \$5,000 contingency for carpentry work. The total amount being appropriated in the Warrant is \$28,000 to allow for inflationary changes in repair contingencies. The second project is the repair/replacement of the bell voke in the Old Meeting House. We have received an initial estimate of \$18,000, and these are currently being updated. The Warrant appropriates \$22,000 for this project allowing for contingency fund. These projects will be funded by a withdrawal from the appropriate CRF.

- The fourth project is the reconstruction of Red House Road with a budget of \$345,000.
 This projected is to be funded by a withdrawal from the appropriate CRF.
- A fifth warrant article was added by the Select Board following the completion of the CIP which appropriates \$100,000 for bridge repair/construction. These projects include repairs to the Morse Bridge (2nd NH Tpke South, Green rail) and the completion of a new bridge at the intersection of Reid Road and Greenfield Road. Other costs for the new bridge at Reid Road were appropriated from supplemental funds provided by the State for road and bridge maintenance.

The CIP also provides a plan for funding the Capital Reserve Funds as there are some major obstacles to overcome in the next few years, to include the purchase and outfitting of a hybrid pumper/engine for the Fire Department in 2025. This new vehicle will replace two existing trucks reducing the overall fleet to 5 major pieces of equipment. This vehicle is estimated to cost \$750,000. In years past, Unassigned Fund

Balance (UFB) has been relied upon to help offset the taxes raised to deposit into the CRFs. The 2021 CIP started a 5 year declining reliance of UFB, but expected budget increases need to rely on the use of UFB in the amount of \$54,600 to maintain tax rate increases to current inflation markets.

Other capital investments over the period of 2024 through 2028 include:

- The replacement of the Library Roof, estimated to cost \$25,000 in 2026. The roof was inspected this past summer, and immediately needed repairs were made, but plans must be made for its full replacement.
- The addition of an easier age-friendly access to the Beach at Scoby Pond.
- The continued review of the infrastructure of all Town buildings to prepare a 10-15 year plan for the replacement of mechanical components, and;
- Another project that the Select Board has discussed is the replacement of the carpet in the lower level of the Town Offices. An estimate for durable vinyl flooring was sought and came back at \$12,000.
- Additionally, it is time to include the replacement of the compactor at the Transfer Station. The current compactor was purchased in 2007 and is approaching its end of life. This project has been inserted into the CIP with a place holder in 2027, but this will have to be re-evaluated annually after maintenance checks.
- The replacement of a 1-ton plow truck and police cruiser in 2024.
- A statistical revaluation is planned and required in 2024. A statistical revaluation does not include the individual property inspections required by a full revaluation which was performed in 2019, but rather just looks at sales and market data to revalue properties.

SOUTHERN NH PLANNING COMMISSION

The Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission (SNHPC) provides a wide range of services and resources to help member communities with a variety of land use planning and transportation challenges. Each year, with the approval of appointed representatives, the Commission's skilled staff designs and carries out programs of regional significance mandated by New Hampshire and federal laws or regulations. The Commission also works with community staff, land use board volunteers, and governing boards on a variety of local projects.

Often, community stakeholders request assistance from SNHPC for traffic, pedestrian, and bicycle counts, grant assistance, specific studies, mapping, and facilitation services. Technical assistance is provided in a professional and timely manner as SNHPC carries out projects of common interest and benefit to all member communities; and keeps officials apprised of changes in planning and land use regulations.

In 2022, the Commission provided the Town of Francestown with assistance on a number of local planning efforts including:

- Conducting traffic counts,
- Updating the Regional Housing Needs Assessment, and
- Updating the Ten-Year Transportation Improvement Plan.

The following table details services performed for the Town of Francestown during the past year and includes both hours worked specifically for the Town and for regional projects involving multiple municipalities. In the latter case, the total hours spent by SNHPC staff are divided equally by the number of communities, resulting in time allotment attributed to each community. of Examples regional projects are of New development the Hampshire Department of Transportation (NHDOT) Ten-Year Transportation Improvement Plan and the development of the Regional Housing Needs Assessment.

Worked toward a statewide transportation needs assessment (ongoing). Assisted with a statewide volunteer driver recruitment initiative that culminated with a website and multi-media outreach campaign. Represented RPCs on the State Coordinating Council for Community Transportation (SCC) to better coordinate transportation options throughout New Hampshire; participated in monthly meetings, provided insight regarding volunteer driver program initiatives and transportation needs for older adults, and contributed to a statewide proposal to assess the transportation needs of older adults. Began updating the region's Climate Action and Adap-4 tation Plan (ongoing project). Hosted CommuteSmart NH challenge to encourage multi-modal trips (transit, carpooling, bicycle, etc.) to help residents save money, reduce wear and tear on their vehicle, help relieve congested roads, and live a healthier, less stressful lifestyle. Coordinated with Rockingham Planning Commission, Strafford Regional Planning Commission, and Nashua Regional Planning Commission on a joint Safe Streets for All grant application to identify potential transportation safety improvements in the region. Completed a 2020 Census data update for the Fran-.5

SUPERVISORS OF THE CHECKLIST

The year 2022 was a very busy one for the three elected Supervisors of the Checklist. We did a "30 Day Letter" session in mid-January removing voters from the Checklist that had moved out of town and were no longer eligible to vote in Francestown. Mandatory sessions were held prior to the School District meeting, the annual Town Meeting, Primary elections, and General elections. These five mandatory sessions and "30 Day Letter" meeting reflect the heavy schedule of elections held in 2022. The Supervisors are also mandated by State law to have certain sessions during the calendar year to register new voters and make additions/corrections to the Checklist. Although many voters choose to complete an application to vote through the Town Clerk's office, the Supervisors must meet prior to an election to enable new voters to register.

As we've had a great tum-over in real estate over the past couple of years, the number of voters registering in NH and Francestown was high this year. Unlike other states, New Hampshire does allow for "same day registration" for voters, provided the voter shows the necessary documentation needed for registration. If an applicant does not have the necessary documentation, he/she still may vote by completing a Qualified Voter Affidavit and have their photograph taken. The ballot clerks then note on the checklist that the affidavit was required and this information is sent to the Secretary of State's office for follow-up. We did not have any

Qualified Voter Affidavits in 2022 as all voters presented the necessary documentation according to state law.

The tum-out for the November 2022 election broke all previous records for the highest number of voters and voters registering for the 1st time.

Francestown Land Trust

Founded in 1986, the Francestown Land Trust (FLT) is dedicated to protecting the agricultural, conservational and recreational value of critical natural land areas in Francestown and nearby environs. As a registered 501(c)(3) tax exempt organization, FLT can hold and monitor conservation easements, help negotiate land transfers, and, with public support, purchase sensitive properties. FLT is a volunteer organization that relies on private donations for its work and is separate from, but coordinates with, the town's Conservation Commission.

Currently, the organization owns properties totaling 1,259 acres, including the Rand Brook Forest and Schott Brennan Falls Reserve. In addition, FLT holds conservation easements on 35 privately owned properties and helps to protect an additional 1,812 acres. With one Executory Interest, FLT helps to protect a total area of 3096 acres. Trail maps for the Rand Brook Forest, Schott Brennan Falls Reserve, Crotched Mountain, and Miller/Dinsmore Brook Conservation Area can be downloaded from francestownlandtrust.org. All land owned by FLT is open for public use.

In 2022, FLT acquired one 12.18-acre parcel of land with help from the New Hampshire Department of Environmental services as the property lies within the well head protection area of a public water system. The property lies across the street from Francestown Elementary School and offers educational opportunities and protects wildlife habitat and public water supply.

Due to the COVID pandemic, FLT had to cut back on our public events, but we were able to present a program on coyotes, with Chris Schadler, as part of the Joan Hanchett Nature Series in cooperation with the George Holmes Bixby Library, the Francestown Conservation Commission, and the Francestown News. We also conducted a series of nature walks in Rand Brook Forest with Rosemary Conroy.

Welcome and Christmas Baskets

Francestown Improvement and Historical Society

In June, Francestown celebrated its 250th birthday with FIHS opening the Beehive and providing support and volunteers for a myriad of activities. Over the summer, the Beehive was open every Friday afternoon with Priscilla Martin and Pam Avery as principal docents, additional openings were available by appointment.

This year's Labor Day, under the leadership of Gabrielle Paige, was held despite the rain showers. The annual parade (this year's theme "It Happened in Francestown") and traditional activities including bargain and food booths, juried arts, local entertainment, and concessions were a success. The weekend festival raised over \$12,000 for FIHS.

The Annual Meeting was once again held outside on November 12th at FIHS Park (across from FIHS Lodge) with 22 members in attendance. FIHS continued to sponsor flowers at the Town Common and Police Department, placed U.S flags on utility poles, hosted the annual lighting of the Christmas Tree, and placed seasonal decorations on both public and private buildings. Finally, a bench was placed outside the Beehive in memory of longtime member and Labor Day aide extraordinaire, Warren Kiblin. The society currently has 200 members.

Old Meeting House

The past year has been another successful one for the Old Meetinghouse of Francestown, which continued to serve as both a cultural anchor and a beautiful visual representation of our community. A combination of continuing and returning program events served well both the people of town and the wider regional community.

The building itself did not require any major projects this year. A new high-tech oil tank was installed in the spring; no other building systems required attention. Cosmetically, the front of the building was painted, starting a systematic "one side at a time" approach to keeping up with exterior maintenance. The wood floor of the foyer and steps going up to the main room were refinished in late summer with an excellent job by Jen Noonan and Heirloom Painting.

On the music front, the summer "Sundays at 4" concert series built on the success of the prior year, offering a variety of musical styles each week during July and August (one event moved to September due to its July date having a dangerous heat index), featuring a mix of returning acts and newcomers. Performers included those with connections to Francestown and the region as well as those from further afield, and provided a summer of country, jazz, Americana, singer/songwriter, and "American Songbook" stylists. Electric Earth Concerts put on an additional summer show featuring a worldrenowned violinist. The OMH Holiday Concert, which had been a fixture of years past and returned in 2021, continued this past December with wonderful performances by both the ConVal High School Select Choir and the Boston-based Renaissance Men vocal group.

Beginning with the December Holiday Concert and moving forward with the upcoming "Sundays at 4" series, the Old Meetinghouse Board has decided to offer free admission to OMH programs in order to better serve the people of this community and share in the experience of this beautiful structure. This decision was made possible through significant individual donations. The Board is examining ways to continue this policy in the future, both via a "Program Fund" donation option on our annual membership appeal and possibly through sponsorship by local businesses.

The spring "Tour de Francestown" bike ride, which attracted over 100 registrants, returned this

year after a COVID-induced absence. Unlike the prior road ride, it switched to a "gravel grinder," which took adventurous riders on either a 25- or 50-mile loop along dirt and Class VI roads in Francestown, Greenfield, and Deering. Several riders indicated that this was one of the favorite rides they had done, due in great part to the tremendous job done by Melissa and Ed Dishong, who employed their experience and expertise to connect us with an online registration portal, plan and mark the routes, and provide us with sound advice. We could not have done it without them, and look forward to this event's continuation and growth.

The Old Meetinghouse featured prominently in Labor Day activities. We provided the venue for the full house at the FIHS's wonderfully creative and entertaining "Vespers" performance based on the parade's theme, "It Happened in Francestown." As in the past, the OMH also had ice cream treats available, but given the chilly and rainy weather this year, these were not as popular as they had been.

On the last day of 2022, we were also the setting for a wedding, the first in several years. Lorrie Deyelle and Bruno Mailhot of the Blue Bear Inn tied the knot with their families and friends. We wish them all the happiness in the world, and thank them for bringing weddings back to the building! Hopefully we can host more of them in the years ahead.

We also express our thanks to the people of Francestown for their support in the form of program attendance, donations, memberships, and appreciative comments. Specific thanks go to Ed and Melissa Dishong, Jen Noonan, Larry Kullgren, the Police and Fire Departments for their assistance, and in particular Rick and Steven Miller for always being there when we need them.

Finally, we want to recognize the contributions to our organization made by David Luther. After serving the last three years as President out of six years total on the Board, he decided to step down on January 1. Under his leadership, the summer concert series has become the successful program it is, the Holiday Concerts and Tour de Francestown have resumed, the building is in great shape, and the organization's finances are solid. It is in no small part due to his vision, direction, organization, and attention to detail that the Old Meetinghouse has become, in the words of a Town resident after a concert last year, "a center of culture in Francestown."

Francestown Academy Corporation

The Patrons and Proprietors of the Francestown Academy Corporation held their Annual Meeting on October 11th in the Academy Building, now known as the Town Hall. Randy Wheeler and Eleanor Kiblin have resigned from the Corporation after many years of service and Lisa Stewart has been elected to join.

The Academy Corporation currently offers scholarship awards to Francestown youths who have completed one year of post-secondary education. Since 1929, when the Academy ceased providing education directly, the Corporation has provided more than \$100,000 in scholarship aid to hundreds of Francestown students. Only 2 scholarship applications were received in 2022 and both were awarded. Applications are available by contacting the Academy at PO Box 57 in Francestown and are due by September 1* each year.

Turnpike Trails

Turnpike Trails is a conservation and recreation initiative started in 2019 to protect a key "green corridor" off Route 47 in Francestown located between Crotched Mountain, Shattuck Pond, and Dinsmore Brook conservation lands. A key objective of this project is to develop a recreation trail system oriented toward mountain biking, but also suitable for walking and hiking. These trails serve to connect these conservation lands.

A second objective is to protect and document the unique history of these properties in and around the discontinued portion of 2nd NH Turnpike that were once owned in the 1800s by Thomas E. Fisher, a prominent and early town resident. The project is a partnership involving the Conservation Commission, Francestown Land Trust, and Jim & Cindy St. Jean.

In 2022, the project reached a critical milestone with over 7 miles of trails completed. These trails involved hundreds of hours of hard work including 3 group trail days and many volunteers from Francestown and surrounding towns. The new trails created this year are: Little Deuce Coupe, Bumpy Ride, Runnin Down a Dream. Little Red Corvette, Drivers Seat, 92 Subaru, Chasing Cars, and Road to Nowhere. Most trail names relate to songs that have a transportation theme in honor of the old turnpike. The plan is to complete at least 9 miles of trails before summer 2023 at which time an official launch event is anticipated. ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

SILAS LITTLE, CHAIR

In 2022, the Board received five applications for variances from the standard lot line setbacks and from the overlay district setbacks. Three of the applications were granted. One application was withdrawn. The fifth application is in abeyance until the land owner informs the Board whether he wishes to go forward, in which case new notices will be sent to abutters, posted and published.

May 11 - Anna Dingman & Jared Nelson, Map 4 Lot 21, Shorten front and side setbacks Variance application withdrawn.

May 12 - Richard & Cathy Eby Map 9 Lot 29-1, Single family home

Variance was granted with the below conditions:

- The location of the septic system and house shall be as shown on the submitted plan.
- Appropriate erosion control measures be in place prior to any excavation or construction activity and shall be maintained until construction work is completed.
- A naturally vegetated buffer or at least 10' be left along the wetland edge and the structure/ septic system.
- The drive location onto Bible Hill Extension be approved by the Road Agent and the drive surface shall be gravel.
- The 10' setback from the wetland edge and the structure/septic system shall be marked by permanent monuments.

June 9 – Thomas Hill Map 17 Lot 3, Stairs and screened deck within the protected shoreland at Pleasant Pond

Variance was granted with the below conditions:

- The height of the "Screen House" not to exceed 12' from the deck
- The deck not to exceed 3' from ground

- Where possible, 4-6" crushed stone be placed at the eve drip line
- The lower set of stairs will involve no machinery in construction
- The path to the upper stairs and the deck be kept to 6' or less in width during construction
- The recommendations of the Conservation Commission to the extent not altered by the Board's conditions be filled.
- The roof pitch on the screened deck structure be minimal
- The runoff from the roof be collected via a French drain/crushed stone trench or other appropriate structure that would serve to minimize impacts from the roof runoff.
- That construction impacts be minimized to the extent reasonably possible; and appropriate erosion control measures be used during construction and maintained as long as needed.
- The application to the NH DES be filed with the Board and its provisions are followed.

July 14 – Jack & Nancy Curren, Map 19 Lot 19, Boat shed on island in Pleasant Pond

Variance was granted with the below conditions:

- The Conservation Commission's approval of the request for this variance with the stipulation that one the drip edge along the eaves where any natural cover has been disturbed crushed rock 1.5" minus be placed to control possible run-off.
- The ZBA stipulations in the application, vide dimensions, no heat in building, no electricity, no plumbing, and it is not to be used as a living space for humans.

Oct 13/Nov 14 - Richard Lawrence, Map 6 Lot 74-6, Single family home

Variance was requested to permit the construction of a residential dwelling withing the 100' setback from wetlands. During October 13 meeting, it was asked why the proposed structure was not setback 400' as required by the backlot. November 14 meeting, both variances were discussed and it was recommended consult with a land use attorney. No further action.

ARTICLE 2

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 1 as proposed by the PLANNING BOARD for the Francestown zoning ordinance as follows:

Amend Article II, Section 2.A.6.2: Description of Shorelands District to replace outdated references with references to the current Conservation Plan and Natural Resource Inventory and to replace reference to Pond B with all ponds over 10 acres. The purpose is to correct outdated references.

Yes - 348 No - 92 Article passes.

ARTICLE 3

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 2 as proposed by the PLANNING BOARD for the Francestown zoning ordinance as follows:

Amend Article III, Section 3.5, Obnoxious Uses to include forestry as an expressly excluded use.

The purpose is to specifically identify forestry as a permitted agricultural use. Forestry is defined as "The science of developing, caring for or cultivating and managing growing trees."

Yes - 335 No - 101 Article passes.

ARTICLE 4

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 3 as proposed by the PLANNING BOARD for the town zoning ordinance as follows:

Amend Article III, Section 3.9.2, Home-Based Businesses, to increase by one the number of commercial vehicles and allow for two trailers for home-based businesses on lots greater than one acre. It would remove restrictions on excessive traffic and impose setbacks for storage of commercial equipment and materials.

The purpose of this amendment is to more adequately address the requirements of today's small-businessperson.

Yes - 192 No - 247 Article fails.

ARTICLE 5

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 4 as proposed by the PLANNING BOARD for the Francestown zoning ordinance as follows:

Amend Article III: add Section 3.17 which would allow short-term rentals in single-family dwellings

by Conditional Use Permit issued by the Planning Board. This amendment adds a definition of life safety code to Section VIII Definitions and amends zoning ordinance tables to reflect changes.

The purpose is to allow short term rentals, like Airbnbs, provided that they obtain a Conditional Use Permit from the planning board. Note: in order to administer this ordinance, the following WARRANT ARTICLE #6 (amendment #5) must also pass.

Yes - 244 No - 191 Article passes.

ARTICLE 6

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 5 as proposed by the PLANNING BOARD for the Francestown zoning ordinance as follows:

Amend Article III: add section III-B: Which would authorize the planning board to grant Conditional Use Permits for specific uses as authorized in the ordinance. And to amend Zoning Ordinance Tables to reflect changes.

The purpose of this article is to allow low impact uses to be permitted utilizing a simplified approval process but only when specifically authorized by the ordinance.

Currently, most non-residential uses in Francestown require both a special exception from the zoning board and site plan review from the planning board. A majority of the planning board believes that there are some uses which are minimally impactful and which, when practiced to scale, can be permitted utilizing this less cumbersome land use permit.

Yes - 278 No - 157 Article passes

ARTICLE 7

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 6 as proposed by the PLANNING BOARD for the Francestown zoning ordinance as follows:

Amend Article III, Section 3.11 to allow for Accessory Dwelling Units (ADUs) in detached accessory buildings on conforming lots. And to amend the Article VIII definition and Zoning Ordinance Tables to reflect the change.

The purpose of this article is to provide for a variety of housing options in Francestown by allowing one accessory dwelling unit, attached or detached, per lot on conforming lots with a single family home.

Yes - 306 No - 131 Article passes.

ARTICLE 8

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 7 as proposed by the PLANNING BOARD for the Francestown zoning ordinance as follows:

Amend ARTICLE VII to add Section 7.7.1 Landscaping, Contracting, Businesses where primary activity is offsite. And to amend Zoning Ordinance Tables to reflect changes.

The purpose of this amendment is to establish a special exception use for contractors. This section can be used by contractors who exceed the requirements of Article III, Section 3.9.2: Home-based businesses.

Yes - 211 No - 224 Article fails.

ARTICLE 9

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 8 as proposed by the PLANNING BOARD for the Francestown town zoning ordinance as follows:

Amend ARTICLE VIII, DEFINITIONS: amend the definition of Buffers in order to provide for range in widths and materials.

The purpose of this amendment is to provide specificity for residents to understand a definable description of a vegetative buffer and to afford Town Boards flexibility in reviewing cases for

Site Plan, Special Exceptions and Select Board rulings.

Yes - 288 No - 142 Article passes.

ARTICLE 10

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 9 as proposed by the PETITIONERS for the Francestown Zoning Ordinance as follows:

In Article III, Section 3.9.1 In-Home Businesses, repeal paragraphs (c) and (g).

Description of substance of the amendment:

Paragraph (c) requires:

"The business does not have an adverse effect on the environment or the surrounding properties as a result of nuisances including, but not limited to, noise, odors, smoke, dust, lights, soil, water or air pollution, vibration, glare, electrical disturbances, excessive increases in traffic or frequent visits by heavy trucks or equipment."

The petitioners state that "Most of the adverse effects listed in (c) are prohibited at Section 3.5 Obnoxious Uses, and the terms 'excessive' and 'frequent' are subjective."

Paragraph (g) requires:

There is no exterior storage of commercial material or equipment, including the parking of more than one commercial vehicle and no other exterior indication - excluding a sign - of such use or variation from the residential character of the premises.

The petitioners state that "Paragraph (g) unfairly restricts small business owners as a separate class of citizen."

Yes - 125 No - 286 Article fails.

This is a special non-lapsing warrant article until the project is complete or until December 31, 2023, whichever is sooner, pursuant to RSA 32:7(VI). Motion seconded by Scot Heath.

Article 19 carried.

ARTICLE 20

To transact any other business that may legally come before the Town.

Recognition and expressed gratitude to the volunteer members of Francestown Fire and Rescue for their dedicated and professional service in responding to calls during the Pandemic over these past few years.
