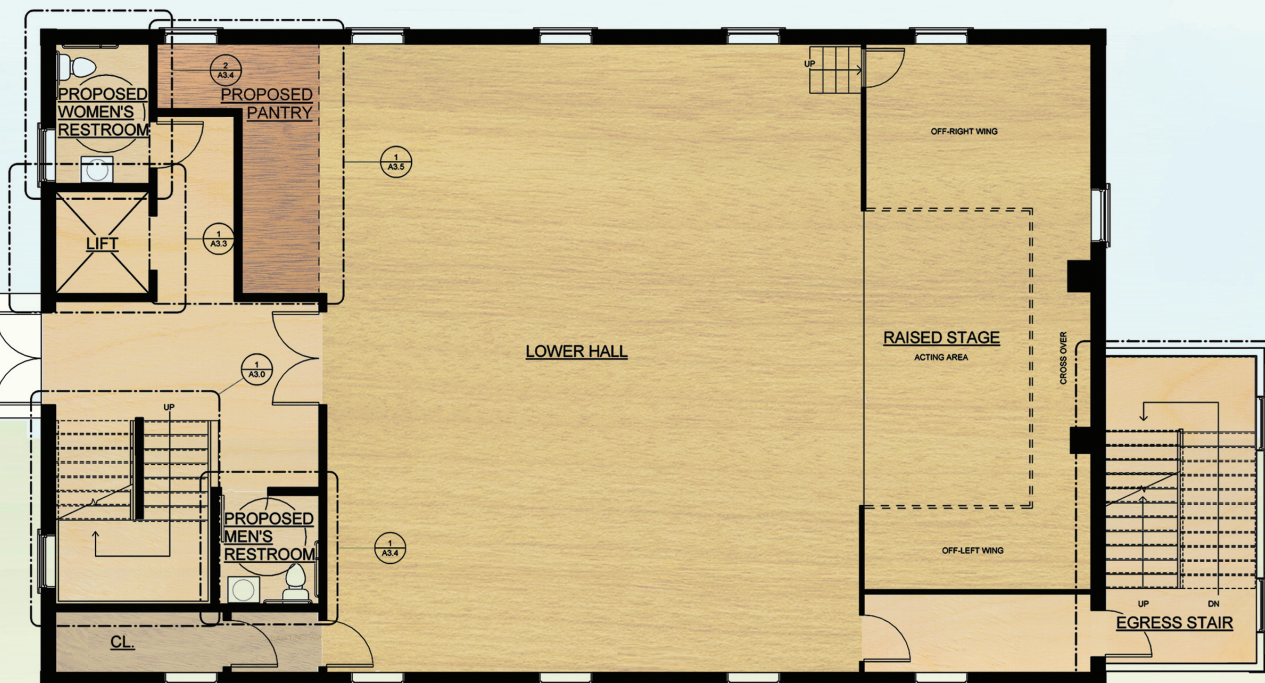
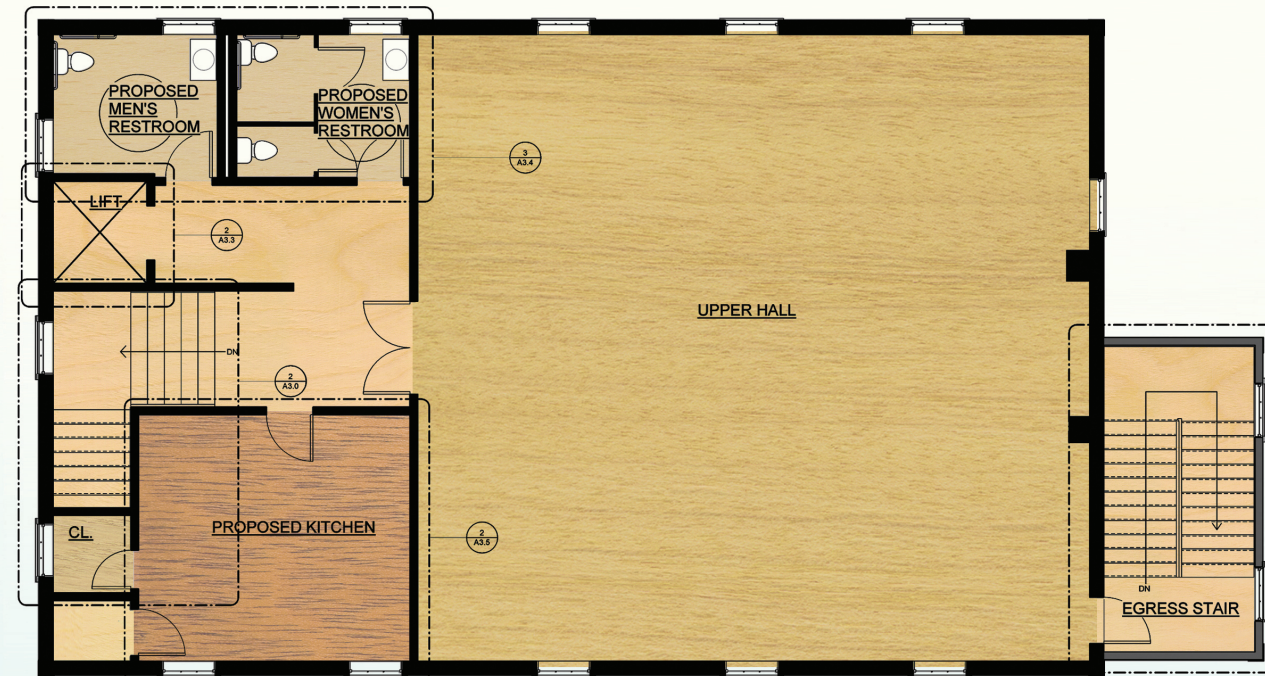


Upstairs, Downstairs

THE RESTORATION & REJUVENATION OF THE FRANCESTOWN TOWN HALL

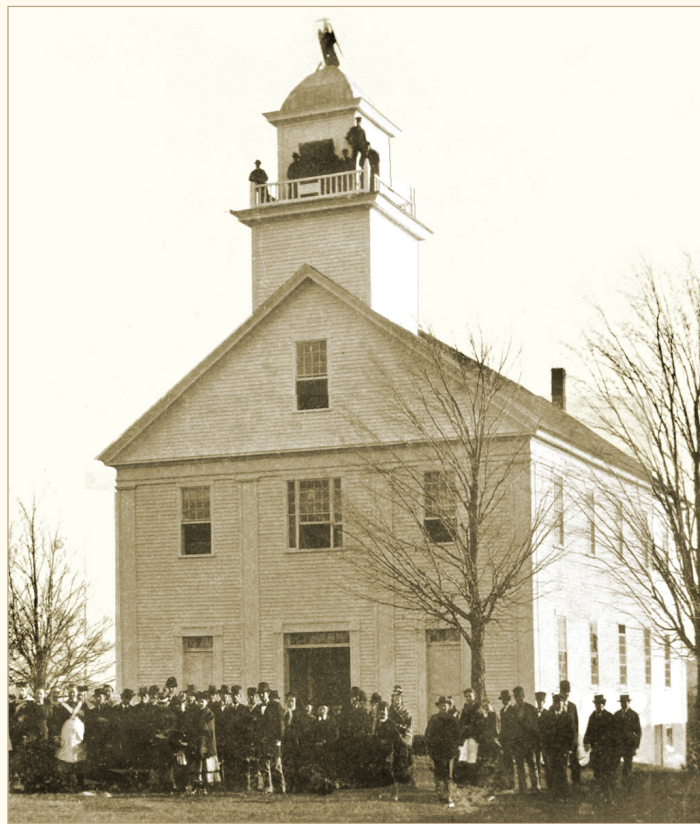
*Building the Future,
Saving the Past*



Francestown's Town Hall has long been a source of pride, playing a defining role in the social, political, and educational history of this picturesque village. A meeting place for organizations and congregations, a postal repository, a library extension and educational institution,

the structure has served many purposes in the town's life over the years. The building we know today was constructed in 1847 in the New England Meetinghouse style inspired by early American architect, Asher Benjamin. A fire destroyed the original structure known as the Francestown Academy (1801-1921), an imposing institution that graduated the likes of

President Franklin Pierce and United States Senator and New Hampshire Governor, Levi Woodbury. Now, almost 170 years later, this venerable community structure needs to be restored to reach its full potential as a working 21st century building. You can help us succeed!

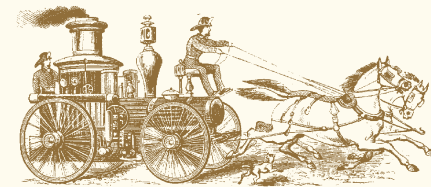


Since It's Broke, Let's Fix It!

The Town Hall, with its distinctive features and craftsmanship has seen relatively little exterior alteration over the years. However, it was closed in 2011, due to the discovery of major structural failures. These were the result of unchecked renovations and changes of use, throughout the life of the building.

Won't Put the Cart Before the Horse

In 2011, the Heritage Commission took on the task of evaluating the building. Consultant James L. Garvin was hired to



make an assessment of the character-defining features of the structure in order to assess the likelihood of qualifying for grants. At the same time, the current and future needs of the Town were polled through formal queries, informational meetings, and directed discussions. As a result, it was decided to save and update this historic building to continue to serve the residents of Fracesttown in new and fulfilling ways.

We Measure Twice & Cut Once

Once the decision was made to save the structure, the Town engaged the services of local timber framer, Glen Dodge, of Dodgco, Inc., to repair the failing roof framing. His historically accurate improvements meet current structural requirements of the building code, and they also protect the Town Hall from the threat of collapse during a winter storm.

\$ Doesn't Grow on

After the Town embraced rehabilitating the Town Hall, residents approved a 2014 warrant to borrow \$350,000 to partially fund the project. The Town also applied for, and received, a \$200,000 NH LCHIP (the Land and Community Heritage Investment Program) grant for the project. Now, the Heritage Commission and the Friends of the Fracesttown Town Hall work to raise the remaining funds needed. [Please refer to the enclosed budget insert.]

* The carved eagle, a gift from Boston friends in 1847, fell prey to over-ebullient marksmen. The restored original now greets visitors on the second floor, and a replica perches atop the cupola. Information about the eagle & the reconstruction was gleaned from 'The Students' Journal, February of 1880.
