Summon your Doctor in the olden days and they would arrive in their Doctor's buggy (Yes, the Doctor even made house calls back then). The sight of the Doctor going down the road in his buggy with his bag beside him usually meant some neighbor was in need. Medical emergencies could arrive in any weather, day or night. Thus the covered buggy seat.

This buggy was loaned to the Museum by Walter and Misty Kiblin. We have not yet been able to establish the provenance of this buggy. It was not in the Kiblin family originally. Regardless, it is a vivid reminder of long ago days when the first question asked of those who were ill was not "do you have insurance".



This one-horse, two-person buggy was donated to the Museum by the Hill Family in Memory of Ellen Mayo Hill. This buggy was purchased new by the family and had remained there until now. Our resident Hill Family member, Isabella Britain Hill is trying to determine just when the family purchased this buggy and who the maker was.

For its age this buggy is in remarkably good condition and has never been restored. The wood is solid and even the leather seat covering is still flexible. The wheels are tight and the buggy rolls easily – a fact no doubt appreciated by the horse.



This one-horse, one-person sleigh is on loan to the Museum from the Place Family members. Here again, we know this sleigh was original to the Place family but have not determined the year purchased or the maker.

As with the Hill family buggy, this sleigh for its age is in remarkably good condition and has never been restored. The wood is solid, the shafts move easily and the runners are tight.

In addition to these three major items, the Museum has also received a number of other gifts from the Thulander Family ranging from a corn seeder to a three holed privy seat. Yes, the holes are a different size to accommodate Mama Bear, Papa Bear, and Baby Bear (an item overlooked in the tale of Goldie Locks and the Three Bears).
