#### Let's do a recap of 2007 and note the accomplishments we have made.

- > In June the new Francestown owned compactor was installed.
- > New Facility Permit Stickers were issued to residents in July.
- > We have expanded our monthly news article to be in the Monadnock Ledger Transcript as well as the Francestown News.
- > The quarterly newsletter 'Talkin' Trash' was created. We hope all residents are getting the latest "trash" on the station.
- > Employees were supplied with uniforms.
- > Beverage Recycle containers were placed in all the town buildings.
- ► E-Waste was implemented on July 1st. The fees charged for e-waste are the actual costs for recycling the material.
- > Kay Anderson, Lori Ricci and George Cilley are working closely concerning the number of hauls and the cost of each. As each month goes by we are able to build a larger database. We will be able to make good sound budget decisions going forward with this data.
- > Shaw, Inc has replaced Waste Management, Inc as our MSW, C&D, Aluminum and Glass hauler.
- > We tabled the change to see-thru plastic bags for the MSW compactor due to the positive response in proper recycling from the residents! We don't need to police our residents!!!!
- We have established that the existing staff at the Station is adequate. George Cilley, Heather Ayers and George Morgan are doing a **Great Job** of keeping the Station looking it's best. The swap room is kept well organized with the collection of books astounding.
- A suggestion box was placed in the recycling area on the beam between the glass and plastic/aluminum area.
- > A bulletin board was placed in the swap shop for items of trade or sale.

- We have purchased a white board, which will be located on the Swap Shop building. # EDUCATION is KEY for a Successful Recycling Program

This educational segment is intended to assist the community in properly streamlining our "trash".

### Plastic. What types of plastic do we recycle?

The Transfer Station accepts all <u>CLEAN & RINSED</u> plastic with a #1 or #2 shown in the small recycle logo (triangle) usually found on the bottom of the plastic container. Plastic #1 is Polyethylene Terephthalate (PET). The most common uses for PET are beverages containers (soda & water), cooking oil bottles and peanut butter jars. Plastic #2 is High Density Polyetherene (HDPE). The most common uses of HDPE are detergent bottles and milk jugs. <u>PLEASE REMOVE ALL CAPS FROM ALL JUGS</u>. The caps, which are made of a different type of plastic, should be placed in the compactor with the rest of your household trash (MSW). Recent information published by the Container Recycling Institute in Washington, DC revealed that in 2005, an estimated 144 billion containers were "wasted" in the United States. Wasted means not recycled: sent to landfills or incinerators, or littered along our country roads, parks, fields & streams, rivers and beaches. PET is a petroleum based product. The Container Recycling Institute estimates that approximately 18 million barrels of crude oil equivalent were consumed in 2005 to replace the 2 million tons of PET bottles alone, because they were wasted and not recycled. YOU can make the difference! Recycle all plastic beverage containers.
